"Playing A Bizarre Game"



In graduate school at Cambridge, a group of us once played an unusual card game one of our philosophers made up. There were a few procedural rules for taking turns, but basically everyone had their own rule for winning, that is, their own distinct purpose and objective in the game. If you decided that your purpose was to hold all the jokers, or to hold both black kings but never the red kings, or to hold only the two of spades, then upon achieving this objective, you won. In fact, you could go on for quite a while without anyone ever guessing your rule, and so you could keep winning. And your neighbor, similarly could keep winning. But if anyone guessed your objective during play, then you lost your hand, and were out of the game. The longer you played, the more you figured out the objectives of other players. So it was really a game of bluffing about your ultimate ends. But the game necessarily excluded the objectives of the many, and rewarded those who could veil their objectives long enough to dominate and have victory over all.

I have often thought of this bizarre—and I must add, very disorienting—game as the perfect metaphor for a certain kind of liberalism which claims neutrality with respect to the purposes of life, liberty, and happiness—things which can only find their purpose in God. It may at first seem like a game which allows people to share in a common thing, but as the game goes on it becomes clear that there is no commonality at all. The game could go on for quite awhile but, in the end, the advantage always goes to the person who can deceive the best.

At the end of yet another Pride Month this past June, I couldn't help but sense that this type of bewildering game is currently happening in America—courtesy of this same sort of liberalism. It wasn't too long ago that just a tiny percentage of the population began asking for a redefinition of marriage. However, we now have people forcing bakers to make certain kinds of cakes, school administrators redefining sex education in public schools, transgender men dominating women's sports, and so-called trans-kids "twerking" on floats in pride parades. Things have escalated quickly and what was strange has seemingly become commonplace.

When former President Obama lit up the White House a few years ago for Pride Month with the colors of the pride flag, it felt like that card game all over again—a game in which the common thing was defeated, and the hand of identity politics won yet another round in the game of liberal ends. On a well-traveled road near my neighborhood, I frequently see a million-dollar home that proudly flies an American flag—except that it has been altered to display the colors of the pride flag in place of our red, white, and blue. It is a consistent development after the Supreme Court, the White House, and Corporate America all indicated their obeisance to the new standard. But what kind of standard is it?

In truth, pride is a standard which *cannot* tolerate a common good. It must take away from the good which is common, and become the part which rules over the whole. It is not a truly American standard. It does not represent a common thing or a common object of love in which we can all participate. It is an exceptional standard built around sexual desire, identity, and power. St. Augustine called such a thing "*it libido dominandi*"—the lust for domination. And no one can argue that lust hasn't dominated. But there are signs that pride goeth before a fall. Even some tireless proponents of "the cause" have expressed concern that the percentage of young men who consider themselves "allies" of the cause has nearly been cut in half since 2016, from 62% to only 35%. One of these proponents, Andrew Sullivan, writes: *"The turn began in the year that the Obama administration—with no public discussion or congressional support—imposed critical gender theory on America's high schools, determining one's sexual identity to be whatever a student says it is. The imposition of trans-ideology by fiat on the entire country's young—along with severe public stigma for those with even the slightest question—was almost textbook leftist authoritarianism."*


The standard of sin always depletes people precisely by dominating them, enslaving not only their souls, but whole nations. Pride is the standard for the desires of the few dominating the many. As Augustine writes, "*I cannot refrain from speaking about...a city which aims at dominion, which holds nations in enslavement, but is itself dominated by that very lust of domination.*" It's the city of that card game. It is our hope that Americans can turn to a better flag than the pride flag. In the meantime, Catholics should help their fellow Americans look to a better city.

"VANITY OF VANITIES..."

Today's readings urge us not to misuse our relatively limited time on earth. Even someone who lives well beyond the age of 100 has only lived a bare, minuscule portion of eternity. Ecclesiastes reminds us that because God provides for us now and always, we can manage our daily affairs without anxiety. St. Paul encourages the Colossians to keep thoughts of Heaven in everything they do, and Jesus Himself asks us to treasure NOT earthly wealth, but God alone.

Unfortunately, from the negative, unfeeling way in which we see many people—including even daily Mass-goers!—treat others, and by how selfishly these persons appear to lead their lives (thinking only of themselves and their close family members and friends), it seems that they **COULDN'T REALLY BELIEVE** that there is a Heaven and a Hell—fundamental teachings of our Catholic Faith—or they would certainly display more Christ-like qualities. Especially as people get older and "nearer to crossing over to the other side,"—closer to eternal life, a life that will *never, never, ever* end!—you would think they would go out of their way to "do unto others..." as they would have done unto themselves. Sadly, many live out their days in this world as though these temporary lives and fragile bodies will never end. So many go through their lives no differently than do non-believers. Non-believers aren't worried about what will happen when they die—and neither, it seems, do these people. They are very likely in denial about their callousness.

The truth is, however, that no one who gets to Heaven, Purgatory, or Hell will be taking any money or property with them. Once we enter into eternity, there will be no haves and have-nots, no rich and poor, no landlords and tenants, no bosses and employees, no masters and servants. No, the only thing any of us will bring to Heaven that we had with us on earth will be...OUR HEARTS. If your heart sought to imitate Our Lord and His Saints and attempted to always show love and kindness to others—acquaintances, strangers, and foes, as well as friends and families—then your heart will be richly (no pun intended!) blessed in Heaven. However, if your heart now bears the marks of one who lives without showing mercy and compassion to those whom God put in your path, then **NOW** is the time to truly begin to believe in ETERNITY by changing your actions, your sins of omission, your thoughts, and your callous use of words. It's not too late! You can live like Jesus! Love God NOW by truly following the example of Christ in the final years—or months?, weeks?, days?, or hours?—of your life.

FEAST OF THE ASSUMPTION



Thursday, August 15th, is the Feast of the Assumption of Mary into Heaven and is a holy day of obligation (an obligation, yes—but more of a privilege!).

Mass times for this solemnity will be as follows: In the morning at 6:00, 8:00, and 10:00, and in the evening at 7:30.

Please note that because this feast falls on Thursday, there will be **NO HOLY HOUR AND BENEDICTION** on August 15.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION: Apart from the period from Thanksgiving through Christmas, Summer is a favored time for family reunions--a time when we trace family trees and recall our origins. Worship has a family tree as well, and the way we celebrate today has been influenced by various styles and customs through the centuries. We are Western Christians of the Latin Rite. By far, we are the most numerous Western Christians, but there are other ritual families as well. The Archdiocese of Milan in Italy follows the Ambrosian Rite, Toledo in Spain preserves the Mozarabic Rite, and Lyons in France is home to the Gallican Rite. Other liturgical families, such as the Celtic in Ireland and the Sarum in England, faded away after the Reformation. Until recent times, members of some ancient religious orders such as Carmelites and Trappists followed a pattern of Mass that varied slightly from the plan observed in Latin Rite parishes. The existence of so many liturgical families in the West reminds us that unity, not uniformity, is what the Church seeks to achieve among her children. We are united in faith, but wonderfully diverse in rituals, ceremonies, languages, and customs.
