

THE PASTOR'S LETTER

Greetings on this 21st Sunday of the Year—also the Octave Day of our Heavenly Mom's Birthday into Heaven, otherwise known as the Queenship of Mary (there is a cemetery in Rowland Heights called Queen of Heaven Cemetery). Below is a brief meditation by Fr. Ken Roberts on the Fifth Glorious Mystery of the Rosary, the Crowning of the Blessed Virgin, Queen of Heaven and Earth, to help us engage in a live encounter with our invisible Mother:

"A great sign appeared in the heavens..." "A woman clothed with the sun..." No banquet, no inaugural ball was ever more resplendent. The woman takes her place beside her Son. HOW DID IT FEEL? "With the moon under her feet..." Her work is done. She awaits her award. No woman was ever so honored. HOW DID IT FEEL? "And upon her head, a crown of twelve stars." The moment has come, and she is crowned the First Lady, the Queen of Heaven. HOW DID IT FEEL? Think of your last day on earth. How will it be? Think of your first day in paradise. It will last forever. Think of the reward that Christ has promised you. An eternity of happiness. Do you know how it will be after you die? Close your eyes and try to imagine it. THE EARLY CHRISTIANS DID. *Revelation 12:1

I do hope that you were able to see Fr. Philip Sullivan this weekend before he leaves this Monday morning, August 23rd, to attend some meetings in Rome. How did you like the Paint 'N Pinot evening with him on Friday? Wasn't that great fun, hanging out with Father, as well as great training for prayer? Iconographers speak of how their form of art is literally a form of prayer as they follow their inner inspiration. (So, too, by the way, do surfers speak of their art/sport... but I digress. We'll leave that discussion for another beach...er....day.) Buon Viaggio, Padrino Filippo!!!

On a somber note, if you get out your Bible and look up today's Gospel, you will find the verse, "As a result of this [this being Jesus telling them they must eat His flesh and drink His blood], many of His disciples returned to their former way of life and no longer accompanied Him" (John 6:66—the number of the anti-Christ!). The Eucharist is indeed a hard saying/teaching and a scandal for so many Catholic and non-Catholic Christians. And yet so many of us disciples have no problem believing that Jesus raised Lazarus from the dead simply by saying, "Lazarus, come out [of the tomb]!" Why should it be so hard to believe that He could say to a piece of bread, "This is My Body," and it happens! It becomes His Body! And for any corporal creature, wherever your body is, there is where the whole of YOU is present/existing. You don't just have a body, you are your body!!!

Here, again, from an earlier bulletin, are the main things Catholics believe about the Eucharist. *Which* of these statements about Holy Communion best reflects your belief?



Of the previous five statements, only ONE is correct: Number Four! Here are the statements again, each followed by an explanation:

1. When receiving Holy Communion, you are receiving bread and wine. which symbolize the spirit and teachings of Jesus. By receiving, are expressing attachment to His Person and words. If He really meant to give us His Body under the appearance of Bread, who are we to tell Him what He did and didn't mean.



- 2. When receiving Holy Communion, you are receiving bread and wine, in which Jesus is really and truly present. It is impossible for something to be a thing (bread and wine) and at the same time and in the same way to be a Person (Jesus)—it's either bread and wine OR it's Jesus Himself!
- 3. When receiving Holy Communion, you are receiving the Body of Christ, which has become that because of your personal belief. No, it's not because of your belief, but because of the power of the ministerial Priesthood, that it transubstantiates into bread, and the same for the wine.
- 4. When receiving Holy Communion, you are really and truly receiving the Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of the Lord Jesus Christ, under the *appearance* of bread and wine. This is what the Church teaches, and is the ONLY correct response of the five given.
- 5. It's all a bunch of hocus pocus. No it's not hocus pocus! It's not a bunch of magic! The term "hocus pocus" was originally an anti-Catholic slur on the Latin words of institution: "Hoc est Corpus meum" or "This is My Body". People in the past used it to mock Catholics.


A Gallup Poll of 1992, taken by church-going Catholics, showed the following statistics:

- Three out of ten (30%) Catholics believe that when they receive Holy Communion they are "really and truly receiving the Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of the Lord Jesus Christ, *under the appearance* of bread and wine." Older Catholics are the most likely to believe this. Among those 50 or older, 50% say the above statement best reflects their belief about Holy Communion compared with 21% of those under 50 years of age.
- Three out of ten (30%) Catholics believe that "when receiving Holy Communion, they are receiving bread and wine, which *symbolize* the spirit and teachings of Jesus and, in so doing, are expressing their attachment to His Person and words." Younger Catholics tend to believe this statement. Among those under the age of 50, 36% say this statement best reflects their own views compared with 13% of those 50 or older.
- One-quarter (25%) of Catholics think, "when receiving Holy Communion, they are receiving the Body and Blood of Christ, which has become that because of their personal beliefs." In addition, one out of ten (10%) think, "when receiving Holy Communion, they are receiving bread and wine, in which Jesus is really and truly present."

If you didn't choose Number Four above and you're one of the 85% of Catholics who don't understand what the Church teaches about the Holy Eucharist, I'd like to suggest that you read a good Catholic book about it—maybe *Calvary and the Mass* by Archbishop Fulton J. Sheen—and ask Jesus to reveal Himself to you more clearly during your thanksgiving prayer after receiving Holy Communion.

JUBILANT IN THE HOLY SPIRIT



It is often assumed that the gift of tongues ceased after the New Testament era, since the Church Fathers rarely speak of it. But, in fact, the gift did continue, under a different name: *jubilation*. The Church Fathers used the term *tongues* for the version of this gift that was manifested at Pentecost, when the crowd miraculously heard the apostles speaking in their native languages (Acts 2:4-11). On the other hand, jubilation referred to the version of this gift that Paul describes in the 14th chapter of 1 Corinthians: joyful praise of God that overflows aloud in an

unintelligible language. St. Augustine describes jubilation this way: "One who jubilates does not utter words, but a certain sound of joy without words: for it is the voice of the soul poured forth in joy, expressing, as far as possible, what it feels without reflecting on the meaning. Rejoicing in exultation, one uses words that cannot be spoken and understood, but he simply lets his joy burst forth without words; his voice then appears to express a happiness so intense that he cannot explain it."

Augustine encourages his congregation to jubilate and not to refrain from praising God just because they cannot find the right words: "Rejoice and speak. If you cannot express your joy, jubilate. Jubilation expresses your joy if you cannot speak. Let not your joy be silent." St. Gregory the Great (Pope Saint Gregory I) adds that such praise can also be expressed in bodily gestures: "What we call jubilation is an unspeakable joy which can neither be concealed nor expressed in words. It shows itself, however, by certain gestures." During the ancient liturgy, the congregation would often jubilate together and sing spontaneous melodies under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit. St. John Chrysostom writes, "Though men and women, young and old, are different, when they sing hymns, their voices are influenced by the Holy Spirit in such a way that the melody sounds as if sung by one voice."

The fifth-century monk, St. John Cassian, reports that sometimes a monk would be so filled with "inexpressible delight and keenness of spirit" that he would actually break forth into shouts of uncontrollable joy that could be heard in the cells of neighboring monks. At other times, the Holy Spirit would bring a profound quiet, so that "the overawed spirit either keeps all its feelings to itself or loses them and pours forth its desires to God with groanings that cannot be uttered."

The decline of the gifts: In the centuries following the Patristic era, the use of spiritual gifts waned, although they never completely disappeared from the life of the Church. There were several reasons for this decline. First, the legalization of Christianity in the fourth century meant that it was now safe and sometimes even socially advantageous to become a Christian. This new situation led to a large influx of new converts, not all with the same sincerity or fervor as earlier generations. Consequently, there was a lowering of standards for baptismal preparation. It was no longer common to expect supernatural gifts as a normal effect of receiving the Holy Spirit at baptism. In addition, more Christians were being baptized as infants, with the risk that as they grew to adulthood, not all would personally appropriate the new life they had received or develop a living faith in Christ.

Second, the Montanist movement, which put an exaggerated emphasis on prophecy, led to a reaction against all charismatic manifestations. The Montanists made strange prophetic declarations and saw themselves as having a higher a uthority than the bishops. As a result, the movement came to be regarded as heretical, and many church leaders became wary of charisms in general.

"DO YOU ALSO WANT TO LEAVE?"

There is an axiom that states, "Not to decide is to decide." This saying was popular in the turbulent times of the Vietnam War. It urged us not to allow others to answer the moral questions raised by our nation's involvement in that terrible conflict, but to decide for ourselves. Jesus, for His part, was not only a gallant risk-taker, but also a clear decision-maker. He worked hard to lay out a scenario that would enable others to make good choices. Never did He make decisions for others or force others into decisions—even decisions that had eternal ramifications. Jesus is inviting us to make such decisions today. Take the risk! Decide!

In today's First Reading (Joshua 24:1-2, 15,17,18), Joshua and the Israelites are preparing to enter the Promised Land, and Joshua asks the people to decide which god they will follow, the Lord their God, or the gods of neighboring peoples. He is asking them for a commitment and proclaims, "As for me and my household, we will serve the Lord." Our Responsorial Psalm features Psalm 34, the "taste and see" psalm that reflects the kinds of struggles the Israelites faced during their sojourn in the wilderness. In the Second Reading (Ephesians 5:21-32), Paul gives counsel for maintaining domestic peace and happiness. In John's



Gospel (6:60-69), we hear the conclusion of the Bread of Life discourse. Sometimes in life we find ourselves at a crossroads, faced with an existential choice that will alter the course of our life. We are aware, at these moments, just how significant our choice will be and that there will be no going back.

If you want to start an argument, try telling your wife that St. Paul's letter to the Ephesians says she should agree with everything you say. I'm sure that many people have taken out of context the line about wives being submissive to their husbands. In fact, the first sentence says both parties should be subordinate to one another (Eph 5:21). And even more important is the last verse: Paul says he is actually talking about Christ and the Church and mentions the main example: Christ handing Himself over for her (the Church) refers to His death on the Cross. He made it even clearer for them the night before He died: He washed the feet of His disciples and told them to do the same for each other (John 13:14-15). If you ever had your feet washed on Holy Thursday and were humbled by the experience, imagine having the Son of God wash your feet! Paul explains that marriage is the best example of "love your neighbor as yourself." He quotes Genesis 2:24 about two people becoming one body. So your love for yourself now becomes love for your spouse. Paul's conclusion is that marriage is a sign of what the Church should be. If you ever want to know what the love of Christ for His Church is, look at how a couple in a strong marriage love each other. And if you want to have a good marriage, love each other as Christ loves you.

The people who were following Jesus, crossing the lake twice to pursue Him, eating the bread He miraculously provided, are now puzzled by Jesus proclaiming Himself as "the Bread of Life," and they are incredulous. They refuse to go with Him any further and they drift away. Jesus—with NO attempt to soften His words ("Amen, amen, I say to you, unless you eat the Flesh of the Son of Man and drink His Blood, you do not have life within you." -John 6:53)—turns to the Twelve and asks them, "DO YOU ALSO WANT TO LEAVE?" He is willing to allow His Chosen ones—including us!—to leave Him and His Church rather than to water down anything that He said about His Living Presence in the Eucharist. The apostles, of course, stayed with Jesus. What else could they do? Who else offers such a profound vision of human life? Peter expresses it well: "Master, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life."

Not all of life's crossroads involve our faith, but many do. Perhaps there is someone in your parish who chose to become Catholic and is now alienated from their family; someone who is unhappy with a new pastor and wondering about looking for a different parish; someone who was especially distressed by the clergy sex abuse and prayed long and hard before deciding that she needed her Church to get through it. There may be many in our parishes facing such choices, and they need our support and our prayers. In the meantime, we can hope that someday they will again experience Jesus as the Holy One of God, offering them words of eternal life.


