
# PASTOR'S MESSAGE

Greetings on this World Marriage Sunday and (Saint!) Valentine's Day (tomorrow)!!! What a great pairing these two days are—back-to-back! The second Sunday in February is always celebrated as World Marriage Day in the Catholic Church, a day of celebrating and honoring and giving thanks for this first Sacrament and "Great Mystery" (Ephesians 5:32), the foundation for all the Sacraments, and therefore extra important—indispensable!—in the Christian community.

"One can say that the visible sign of marriage 'in the beginning,' inasmuch as it is linked to the visible sign of Christ and the Church on the summit of God's saving economy, transposes the eternal plan of love into the 'historical' dimension and makes it the foundation of the whole sacramental order. It is a particular merit of the author of Ephesians that he brought these two signs together, making of them the single great sign; that is, a great sacrament ['sacramentum magnum']" (St. John Paul II, *Man and Woman He Created Them*, TOB 95b:7).

Yes, Baptism is the gateway or door to all the Sacraments, and yet Matrimony is the foundation of all the Sacraments. It's right there at the beginning of creation in Genesis (Chapters 1 and 2). St. John Paul, inspired by St. John of the Cross, taught that "The body, in fact, and only the body, is capable of making visible what is invisible: the spiritual and the divine. It has been created to transfer into the visible reality of the world the mystery hidden from eternity in God, and thus to be a sign of it" (*Theology of the Body* 19:4). We can summarize it, as shown in this diagram:

And so, on this occasion of World Marriage Day and Valentine's Day, I encourage everyone reading this—whether married or unmarried—to trust the Church's teaching that we are all invited to marriage (and beyond) with the Holy Trinity! **Let me conclude with quotes from two great saints:** (Fraternally in Jesus, Mary & Joseph, -Fr. ### FROM ST. AUGUSTINE

"Late have I loved you, O Beauty ever ancient, ever new, late have I loved you! You were within me, but I was outside, and it was there that I searched for you. In my unloveliness I plunged into the lovely things which you created. You were with me, but I was not with you. Created things kept me from you; yet if they had not been

in you, they would have not been at all. You called, you shouted, and you broke through my deafness. You flashed, you shone, and you dispelled my blindness. You breathed your fragrance on me; I drew in breath and now I pant for you. I have tasted you, now I hunger and thirst for more. You touched me, and I burned for your peace."


### FROM ST. CATHERINE OF GENOA

A priest spoke to St. Catherine of Genoa (who was a wife and mother) of the higher sanctity of the celibate life. # Happy Saint Valentine's Day!

A common hagiography describes St. Valentine as a priest of Rome. While under house arrest for evangelizing, a judge told him that if he could restore his blind daughter's sight, he would do whatever he asked. Valentine laid his hands over her eyes and her vision was restored. Valentine told him to destroy all his idols, fast for three days, and be baptized. The judge obeyed and he, his family, and his forty-four-member household were baptized. Later, Valentine was again arrested for continuing to evangelize and was sent to Claudius II, who condemned him to death unless he renounced his faith. Valentine refused and was beaten with clubs and beheaded on February 14, 269. An embellishment to this account states that before his execution, St. Valentine wrote a note to the judge's formerly-blind daughter and signed it, "from your Valentine," which is said to have inspired today's romantic missives".

# To Praise and Bless Him Forever and Ever...



Blessed John Ruusbroec, a Dutch mystic of the fourteenth century, wrote of the startling effects of such spiritual inebriation: "Spiritual inebriation means that a person receives more perceptible savor and delight than his heart or desire could long for or contain. Spiritual inebriation produces much strange behavior in a person. It makes one person sing and praise God out of the fullness of his joy, and it makes another shed many tears because of the delight he feels within his heart. In one it produces restlessness in all his limbs, causing him to run and jump and dance about, and in another the force of this inebriation is so great that he must clap his hands in jubilation. One person cries out in a loud voice and so makes manifest the fullness which he feels within, and another becomes silent and seems to melt away out of the delight he feels in all his senses. At times this delight becomes so intense that it seems to such a person that his heart will break because of all these manifold gifts and wonderful works."

Just as in the age of the apostles, the sober intoxication of the Spirit is often experienced as a communal phenomenon rather than just an individual experience. In the Middle Ages, as Franciscan and Dominican friars went from town to town preaching, there were revivals that included processions with banners, torches and jubilant praise of God. A thirteenth-century Franciscan chronicler gives an account of these revivals:

"It was a time of merriment and gladness, of joy and exultation, of praise and jubilation. During this time, men of all sorts sang songs of praise to God. Old people and young people were of one mind. This turning to God was experienced in all the cities of Italy, and they came from the villages to the town with banners, a great multitude of people, to hear the preaching and to praise God. The songs that they sang were of God, not of man, and all walked in the way of salvation. Sermons were preached in the evening, in the morning, and at noon. Men took their places in churches and outdoors and lifted their hands to God, **to praise and bless Him forever and ever.** They wished they would never have to stop praising God, they were so drunk with His love."

# Fasting from the Wound of Abandonment

## PAUSE TO HEAR GOD SPEAK:

"God has said, 'I will never forsake you or abandon you.'"

-Hebrews 13:5

"The LORD will not forsake His people, nor abandon His inheritance." -Psalm 94:14

Today, I choose to fast from the wound of abandonment. It might not be immediately apparent, but if you take a few moments to think about it, the connection between pride and abandonment becomes obvious. Most of us have had an experience of being lost as a child, maybe on an outing with family members. If a memory popped into your head while you were reading this, it probably has some powerful emotions associated with it. You likely felt alone, isolated, unprotected, or uncovered. You might have experienced abandonment in your life through your parents' divorce or a death. Even innocent experiences, like being lost, can leave us with a deep emotional hurt of

I'm completely alone... Everyone has left me... No one cares!

abandonment.

We can begin to expose and uproot this wound by examining the thoughts, beliefs, and emotions in our hearts. If you are hyper-loyal, or require it of others, you might be guarding an abandonment hurt by requiring allegiance or duty. Have you ever felt that? Perhaps you've thought, "In the end, I'll always be alone," "It will always be up to me," or "Nobody will be there to protect me." Let's take some time during the reflection below to allow God to speak to and minister to this wound.

**Take time to ask yourself...**

- What are some of my memories or thoughts around abandonment?
- What do I believe about myself and my life as a result of those memories or thoughts?

Pray slowly... Heavenly Father, In the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, I renounce abandonment and repent all the ways in which I have sinned because of it. I reject abandonment in every area of my life. I renounce any lies that I have come to believe, including lies such as "I am all alone," "I am on my own," or "Nobody cares about me." Send your Holy Spirit to heal, restore, and transform me. I belong to you. I am loved by you. I am chosen by you. I am known to you. Amen.

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

# Woe Is Me?

In Luke's version of the Beatitudes, he has only four blessings and he adds four woes. These woes correspond to the blessings: 1) the poor and the rich, 2) the hungry and the filled, 3) those who weep and those who laugh, and 4) the hated and the well-treated. Did you notice that all the things that we work forty or more hours a week to give to our family are considered "woes"? So, is Jesus saying we should not have savings for the future, food for the kids, a happy, safe environment, or a good reputation?

I suspect that the disciples and the others listening to Jesus wondered the same thing. Jesus may have been exaggerating a little, but He had a point. The values of this world are not necessarily the values of God's Kingdom. For example, self-reliance, usually considered a virtue, can be taken to an extreme of not relying on God for our needs, or for justifying the belief that poverty is the fault of the poor. Jesus Himself is the extreme example of reversing worldly values: His death was not a tragic ending, but the saving action that brought us forgiveness and new life in the Resurrection.

So, how do we experience the blessings of the poor, the hungry, the mourning, or the unpopular? Do we have the faith to let go of self-reliance and to trust in Jesus? How much money does it take to meet the needs of our family? How much do we really need and how much is just extra? Are we really helping our children if we give them anything they want? We teach them to do their best in school and sports. Do we also teach them to give to the poor or to help other children struggling with schoolwork? We buy them nice clothing; do we teach them to see Jesus in others? How can we say this is all too idealistic, and still claim to believe in the Resurrection?

I don't expect everyone do go around saying "woe is me." Some of the happiest people are those who live simple lives of faith and trust in God. When we learn to trust God and love one another, we can not only see Jesus in others, but He can also be seen in us.
