THIRD SUNDAY OF LENT March 2 S MESSAGE PASTOR'S

Blessed Third Sunday of Lent, everyone!

I hope you received extra encouragement and refreshment from the Lord Jesus and the Holy Spirit and the Father by spending some extra time with St. Joseph yesterday and with St. Patrick last Thursday. Did you get a chance to stop by last Friday evening to taste some of the incredible food from our St. Joseph's Table?! THANK YOU to all those who helped prepare—and present!—the food!!! (The French say that you eat with your eyes. In other words, how you present the food is also very important!) THANK YOU also to each and every one of you for your extra prayers and/or financial help for our cloistered Carmelite Nuns down the street and for our school these past few weeks. Every little bit helps!

Reminder: this Friday, March 25th, is the Solemnity of the Annunciation, when the Word Became Flesh and Mary's "Yes!" to the Angel Gabriel allowed the Second Person of the Trinity, Jesus, to become fully one of us. In honor of this Great Mystery of our Faith, we are allowed to eat meat this coming Friday (Canon Law No. 1251). And so we will have another special Friday "Soup Night," just as we had last week to celebrate St Joseph—except this time with meat dishes encouraged! 69



The Gospel today is a clarion call to repentance FOR EVERYONE (beginning with us priests!). One of the most difficult things to repent of is unforgiveness and resentment, which is why we have two spiritual works of mercy addressing that issue: bearing wrongs patiently and pardoning all injuries. Here again misconceptions about forgiveness. If we can clear up these misconceptions, it will become much easier to forgive an enemy. (Think of all the injustice happening in Ukraine right now and the huge need to forgive there!)

- 1) If I forgive, I will become vulnerable to being hurt by this person all over again. (No, I can forgive and still be wise as a serpent about not being hurt again by this person.)
- 2) If I forgive, then I am condoning hurtful actions and saying it's OK to continue the injustice that was done to me. (No, by forgiving I am actually implying that something wrong was done to me.)
- 3) If I don't forgive, I will feel better, because at least I will be holding the other person accountable. (No, unforgiveness and anger actually make us feel worse, and both are bad for the heart, as research shows. So, I'm drinking my own poison by not forgiving, while expecting the other person to die from it! That makes no sense at all, right?)
- 4) If I forgive, then I will have to reconcile with the person who wronged me. (No, forgiveness involves only me and Jesus. Being reconciled involves me and the offender, and one or both parties may not be ready for that just yet.)
- 5) If I forgive, I need to feel like forgiving first. (No, I can decide to forgive even while still feeling all kinds of negative feelings toward the person who hurt me.)
- 6) If I forgive, then I can forget about it and move on. (No, I will still need to go to Jesus and grieve the damage that was done to me, the loss and pain it has cost me—even while forgiving the person who caused that loss and pain. Only then can I move on from being a survivor to becoming a thriver.)

Here is the most effective way to keep a plant of bitterness from taking root in our heart: Know that Jesus is not asking us to change our feelings, but to change our will, to do what is good for that person who hurt us, to pass on to him or her the forgiveness that we ourselves have received from the Lord. So, whenever you notice a hurtful memory or temptation to resentment beginning to appear, immediately begin to say this prayer until the temptation fades: (while breathing in) "In Your Name, Lord Jesus" (then, while breathing out), "I choose to forgive you, (name of the person"). The temptation may come back in a few minutes, so start the prayer again. Jesus: "No, Peter, not seven times, but seventy times seven times..." (Matthew 18:22).

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Lenten Schedule

SOUP NIGHTS are being held in the Hall for the remainder of the Fridays in Lent between 5:30 and 7:00 p.m. The next one will be this Friday, March 25, and—as stated in Fr. Thomas' letter on the preceding page—we will be allowed to eat meat as March 25th is a Feast (the Annunciation). If your family or your group would like to host / co-host a Soup Night (on April 1 or April 8,) please call the office.

STATIONS OF THE CROSS are held in the church every Friday during Lent at 7:00 p.m. Also, Saint Therese Carmelite School has the Stations every Friday during Lent after the 8:00 a.m. Mass.

FAST AND ABSTINENCE: The next mandatory day of fast will be Good Friday, April 15. On that day, **FASTING** is obligatory for all Catholics ages 18 through 59. When fasting, a

person is permitted to eat one full meal, as well as two smaller meals that together are not equal to the full meal. The norms for **ABSTINENCE**

FROM MEAT are binding upon all Catholics from age 14 and up (no upper age limit). The reasons the Church prescribes fasting and abstinence are: as a sharing in Christ's Passion and death, as an expression of inner conversion, and as a form of reparation for sin.



Fasting from the Sin of Judgment

PAUSE TO HEAR GOD SPEAK:

"Therefore, you are without excuse, every one of you who passes judgment. For by the standard by which you judge another, you condemn yourself, since you, the judge, do the very same things."

-Romans 2:1

"Stop judging by appearances, but judge justly." -John 7:24

Today, I choose to fast from the sin of judgment. Many men I know bear deep animosity toward their fathers. These feelings usually stem from the idea that their fathers were in some way cold, distant, hard, absent, mean, or even cruel. These men have been hurt by their fathers, and they judged their fathers for it. But by looking deeper into their fathers' own history, many of



these men found compassion for the same father they hated.

It's pretty easy to judge the hearts and motivations of those around us. We look at their actions and decide (make a judgment) about them or their motives. Many of the men I mentioned eventually understood the deep pain and hurt their own fathers had endured, and they were moved from judgment to compassion. Their fathers' own pain had been the root of sinful behavior that, in turn, hurt their sons. Judgment is a sin that unfortunately encourages us to hang on to unforgiveness in our lives.



Take time to ask yourself...

- Who in my life have I judged and why?
- What do I believe about their motives toward me?

Pray slowly... Heavenly Father, In the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, I renounce judgment and repent all the ways in which I have acted out of it. I reject every form of judgment in my life. I ask you, Father, to forgive me. I forgive myself for my judgments. Holy Spirit, make me aware of any judgmental thoughts, feelings, and actions. Amen.



BEARING FRUIT THIS LENT

As we get to the halfway point of Lent, we may be tempted to overconfidence: "The first three weeks weren't so hard. I can go a few more weeks without the things I gave up. And I've only committed a few sins; maybe I'll go to confession right before Easter." If so, it might be a good idea to look at the second reading and the Gospel. St. Paul says that anyone who is overconfident about their lack of sin "should take care not to fall" (1 Corinthians 10:12). He compares those people to the ones Moses brought through the desert. In fact, many were punished because they were tempted to follow false gods or to complain about the food and drink God provided them. Could the same thing happen to us?

One form of overconfidence is rejecting what we learned as children. We may think, "I'm old enough to decide if I should go to church" or "I can take care of myself now; I don't need God's help." If these sound familiar because you have thought that way yourself, Paul has a warning. His analogy of the Rock following the Hebrews in the desert refers to God's constant presence to the people. In the same way, God is present to us today. But just as God was not pleased with those in the desert, God may not be pleased with us if we continue to ignore Him.

That brings us to the Gospel. In the parable of the fig tree, the owner is not pleased—the tree has not produced any fruit. Unlike the fig tree, God would be happy with any fruit we produce. We could be generous to the poor, we could fight for the unborn child's right to life, or we could simply teach our children how to pray. Like the owner of the fig tree, God is patient, but we only have so much time. So when do you plan to bear fruit?

Quiet Listening Prayer

FROM THE LIVING FLAME OF LOVE

By St. John of the Cross

Because of the refined quality and purity of these delicate and sublime anointings and shadings of the Holy Spirit, neither the soul nor its director understands them; only He who bestows them in order to be more pleased with the soul comprehends them. Individuals can with the greatest ease disturb and hinder these anointings by no more than the least act they may desire of their memory, intellect, or will; or by making of their senses, appetite, knowledge, or their own satisfaction and pleasure. This is all seriously harmful and a great sorrow and pity... Although this damage is beyond anything imaginable, it is so common and frequent that scarcely any spiritual director will be found who does not cause it in souls God is beginning to recollect in this manner of contemplation. How often is God anointing a contemplative soul with some very delicate unguent of loving knowledge, serene, peaceful, solitary, and far withdrawn from the senses and what is imaginable, as a result of which it cannot meditate or reflect on anything, or enjoy anything heavenly or earthly (since God has engaged it in that lonely idleness and given it the inclination to solitude), when a spiritual director will happen along who, like a blacksmith, knows no more than how to hammer and pound with the faculties. Since hammering with the faculties is this director's only teaching, and he knows no more than how to meditate, he will say: "Come, now, lay aside these rest periods, which amount to idleness and a waste of time; take and meditate and make interior acts, for it is necessary that you do your part; this other method is the way of illusions and typical of fools" (Stanza III, Nos. 41, 43).
