A Letter from the Pastor


Blessed Twentieth Sunday of the Year, everyone!

Today is a very difficult Gospel: it sounds like Jesus wants to bring about division between families! But notice how it begins with Him talking about the desire of His heart, which is to set the earth on fire!!! "I have come to set the earth on fire, and how I wish it were already blazing!"

Did that ever happen? Absolutely! On the First Pentecost Sunday about 2000 years ago, when the Holy Spirit came to rest like a tongue of fire above the heads of each of the 120 or so disciples and of Jesus' Mother who were gathered in the Upper Room. And He is still continuing to set the earth on fire with the Holy Spirit of Fiery, Burning Love from the Trinity. And the result of that Divine Outpouring—not the cause but the *RESULT* of it!—will be that families will become divided, divided over the Person of Jesus, over the Outpouring of the Spirit, over the Love of the Father.

Some will want that, will accept Jesus and try to surrender their whole life to Him...and others won't. That is the wonderful and sad reality in this world. Let us continue to pray with patient endurance for unity and surrender to Jesus in all our families, even if it seems like it will never happen. "A slow cure is the best cure," says St. Francis de Sales.

How do we keep from being deceived by the father of lies and losing sight of our true identity? St. Ignatius of Loyola provided a great tool for baptized believers to discern these spirits in his Spiritual Exercises. In the exercises, Ignatius identifies two opposing spirits that he says are always at work in our lives and in the world. He simply calls them the "good spirit" (which represents our hearts attuned to the Holy Spirit) and the "evil spirit" (which refers to our fallen human nature influenced by the father of lies).

Does it make sense to you that, even though they were each baptized and given the gift of the Holy Spirit, both Margaret Sanger and Donna allowed the evil spirit to deceive them? I don't believe that either of these women actively set out to be accomplices of the evil spirit in stealing, killing, or destroying human life. Rather, like Eve, I believe they were first seduced and then deceived by the father of lies into believing that what they were doing was something good or at least necessary. Isn't that the case with us most of the time?

The evil spirit is obviously acting behind the scenes in the act of abortion (which is just a modern version of child sacrifice) as well as in the philosophies that undergird the culture of death. But they are certainly not the only manifestations of the evil spirit. Rejection, which is the fruit of sin, is all around us and inside us. Taking hold in us and in our relationships, the spirit of rejection chokes out the love Jesus promised us (Romans 5:12, John 10:10).

Whenever any aspect of our life, our joy, or our true identity is thwarted or aborted in some way, we can be assured that the enemy of our souls is working to plant seeds of rejection. The evil one, who is eternally rejected, seeks to bring us into his misery. When those seeds are received into the ground of our souls, eventually they become firm roots of rejection, effectively choking out the life God planted in us through Baptism (Matthew 12:22,37; 13:18-29).

The evil spirit, who is himself condemned, tries to bring us under the same condemnation so that we hate and reject ourselves (John 12:31,16:11). As Henri Nouwen observed, this is deadly to our spiritual life: "Self-rejection is the greatest enemy of the spiritual life because it contradicts the sacred voice that calls us the 'beloved.' Being the beloved constitutes the core truth of our existence." Donna knew what she did was wrong, but rather than trust in God's forgiveness as a beloved daughter, she felt like an outcast, forever condemned for her abortions. She came into agreement with the curses of the evil spirit by condemning and hating herself, reinforcing her already deep wound of rejection. The deception from the evil spirit led her to believe that God had rejected her. But Jesus makes it very clear that the Father does not condemn us or reject us: "For God did not send His Son into the world to condemn the world, but that the world might be saved through Him" (John 3:17); "I ask, then, has God rejected His people? Of course not! ...For the gifts and the call of God are irrevocable" (Romans 11:1,29). God is not the one who condemns us; we condemn ourselves by staying in the darkness of our sin and denying His mercy (John 3:17-21; Romans 8:1,33-35). **This is why Baptism is one of God's primary weapons against the tactics of our adversary.**

The Real St. Therese



We published installments from *The Passion of Therese of Lisieux* by Guy Gaucher from June to November 2021. This is the continuation from then.

T H E R E S E ' S ILLNESS: During the severe winter of 1896, the Prioress, Mother Marie de Gonzague, ordered Thérèse to use a foot-warmer heated by live coals to keep her warm. In November, when the

question was raised about Sister Thérèse's departure for a Carmel in Indochina, a Novena was begun to Blessed Theophane Vénard to obtain her complete cure. At the time, she was attending all the community exercises, even Matins. But, precisely during the Novena she started coughing again. "I've gone from bad to worse," Thérèse told Mother Agnes in May 1897. This corresponds with a letter of Sister Marie of the Eucharist to her father where she mentions having visited a sick nun in her cell who had been given a vesicatory the evening before.

At the beginning of Lent, a very weakened Thérèse tried to follow the community exercises to the limit of her strength. By the end of Lent, she fell seriously ill. This would have been at the beginning of April—symbolic because the first letter that mentions Thérèse's last illness was on April 4, Passion Sunday, and the anniversary of her first hemorrhage. Only this Passion was to last much longer than the first time. It would continue for one hundred and eighty days. From that date, Thérèse could no longer continue as if her illness did not exist. The sisters had grown accustomed to seeing her pale and hearing her long coughing fits. She would become more and more separated from community life—living in her cell and then in the infirmary. Her life as a Carmelite—at least exteriorly— would consist in being sick.

Let us now follow Thérèse in what she called her "giant's course": the last months of 1894 until April 1897. This period corresponds approximately with the first symptoms of her disease. During this thirty-month period, Thérèse's presentiments became a conviction: she was soon going to die. A series of important graces enabled her to climb a steep and rapid road. Immense desires were born within her. More and more she had but one goal: To love Jesus to folly, to make Him loved, to die of love for Him. From the end of 1894 to the beginning of 1895, she discovered the Scriptural basis for her Little Way, thanks to her sister Céline's notebook of biblical texts. Her basic intuitions confirmed by Scripture, Thérèse could now go forward.

What Are Spiritual Gifts?

"It is the Holy Spirit who bestows and directs gifts to the Church, the Bride of Christ. It is in fact He who raises up prophets in the Church, instructs teachers, guides tongues, works wonders and healings, accomplishes miracles, grants the discernment of spirits, assigns governance, inspires, counsels, distributes, and harmonizes every other charismatic gift. In this way, He completes and perfects the Lord's Church everywhere and in all things."

In these exuberant words of Novatian, a third-century Christian writer, we see a vision of the Church as alive with the constant working of the Holy Spirit through gifts distributed among the members. These words summarize well what Scripture teaches about the immense value of the spiritual gifts. The New Testament refers to the gifts of the Spirit in many passages, especially in the letters of St. Paul. He coins a term for them: "charism," meaning a gift freely bestowed. It is based on the word for "grace." Grace is the foundation of Christian life: God's favor freely bestowed on us in Christ, saving us from sin and death and giving us a share in His own divine life. A charism is what might be called a "gracelet," a droplet of the vast ocean of God's grace. It is a tangible expression of God's grace in a person's life in the form of a capacity to act in a way that surpasses human power.

Scripture uses a rich vocabulary to describe the charisms. In 1 Corinthians 12:1-7, St. Paul uses no less than five terms. He calls them "spiritual gifts" because they're given by the Holy Spirit. They are "charisms" because they are given freely. They are **"different kinds of service" because their purpose is to serve others.** They are "different kinds of working," because every time we use a gift, the Holy Spirit Himself is working through us. And they are "manifestations of the Spirit," because they make the presence of the Holy Spirit evident to others. The letter to the Hebrews uses yet another term: they are "distributions of the Holy Spirit" (Hebrews 2: 4), because the Spirit distributes them in different measure to different members of the Church.

St. Paul's strong emphasis on the close relationship between the gifts and the Holy Spirit shows that these gifts are not natural healing abilities, but supernatural abilities the Holy Spirit gives to enable believers to be instruments of God's love and power to others.



COME ON, JESUS, LIGHT OUR FIRE!

Tomorrow is the Solemnity of the Assumption. Mary stands with the “great cloud of witnesses” described in Hebrews: those who kept their eyes firmly fixed on Jesus. **We may not be thinking of Mary when we hear Jesus’ harsh words in today’s Gospel; but when she said “yes” to Gabriel, it carried the risk of the rejection and division that Jesus describes.** As the early Christians surely knew, to hold Jesus as the sole leader and perfecter of faith meant that you would likely find yourself divided from those in your household who held other beliefs. This occurrence is not unknown in our own time and place, and many of us surely know a household divided on the issue of religion, even if the divisions are occurring solely through indifference. A life of faith lived to the full will likely eventually call on us to separate ourselves somehow, so we will also one day join the great cloud of witnesses.



Prophets have been described as being on fire with God’s message. Today, that fire in Jeremiah has to keep burning in the bottom of a muddy cistern. The rulers of his own people (including Judah’s king, Zedekiah) have placed him there for speaking an unpopular, if truthful, message to them. His own leave him there, mired in the mud, to starve and die. It takes a foreigner, an outsider, to convince Judah’s king that Jeremiah ought to be rescued, his life spared to continue as God’s prophet. As so often happens in the lives of the prophets, the help and saving power of God are shown through unexpected people in unexpected ways. We can often find ourselves mired in mud of one sort or another. Do we truly have the fire of God’s message in us, so that we can look for our rescue from places we might not expect?

A generation or two ago, these Summer Sundays in Ordinary Time would have been known as “Sundays of Pentecost.” Though we may no longer use that name for these Sundays, the underlying reality is the same. The fire that Jesus speaks about today is the blaze of the Spirit. **The fire He spoke about when He told His followers they were light for the world was the flame of the Spirit lighting the lamp of discipleship.** It takes courageous disciples to allow the blazing fire of which Jesus speaks into their lives, to allow its light, warmth, and even cleansing to work in them and through them. Though we may not want to think about the heat of the Spirit’s fire on a summer Sunday, **that Spirit is always with us, burning within.**

Fasting from the Wound of **Bitterness**


PAUSE TO HEAR GOD SPEAK:

“Love alone makes heavy burdens light and bears in equal balance things pleasing and displeasing. Love bears a heavy burden and does not feel it, and love makes bitter things tasteful and sweet.”

-Thomas à Kempis

“See to it that no one be deprived of the grace of God, that no bitter root spring up and cause trouble,

Today, I choose to fast from the sin of **bitterness**. When you eat a bitter food, it often leaves a sour look on your face. Emotional bitterness has the same effect on our insides. It poisons our hearts and gives life an “unpalatable” taste. We can be bitter toward others as well as toward ourselves. In both cases, bitterness has one outcome: destruction! If we are routinely sarcastic, harsh, and hostile, we should check for bitterness. If we constantly criticize the failings or shortcomings of ourselves or others, bitterness probably has a hold in our lives. The Scriptures refer to bitterness as a root, meaning that it is unseen. When we allow bitterness to take root in our lives, we often blame those around us for our circumstances, rather than take responsibility for the way we handle them.
