unfortunately doesn't reflect) that Jesus, seeing her and the other Jews with her grieving, became as angry as a snorting horse and deeply shaken with fear. Why this strong detail?? Is Jesus angry at Mary and the Jews?? NO!!! He is angry and afraid in the face of death—His friend's death and His upcoming death! He is showing these strong emotions to help every human being down through history until the end of time who gets angry and afraid in the face of death.

So, let us not shove down our anger and fear, but share it with our Lord Jesus and ask Him to guide us in the midst of it all.

Let me make a brief note on today's Gospel: the Raising of Lazarus involves the whole family, with his two sisters both engaging Jesus and asking Him to help them with their brother who has died. And then, after Mary intercedes on her brother's behalf, St. John writes (in the Greek, which the English translation

When Jesus saw her weeping and the Jews who had come with her weeping, **He became perturbed and deeply troubled**, and said, “Where have you laid him?” They said to Him, “Sir, come and see.” And Jesus wept (John 11:33-35).

Faith Academics Virtue

Don't Give Up on the Liberal Arts! *Excerpts from Bishop Robert Barron*

Why do we refer to religion, philosophy, history, literature, and art as "liberal"? We do so because they are free (*liber* in Latin) precisely from utility. And this is to say that they are the highest sort of disciplines, for they are subordinated to nothing outside of themselves. They exist for their own sake, endowed with intrinsic value. In this, they are to be differentiated from the practical arts and sciences, which exist for the sake of something else. So, one studies engineering in order to construct machines that accomplish some useful purpose; or one studies architecture in order to erect buildings; or one studies mechanics in order to get a car to run; etc. But one reads Shakespeare because it is beautiful so to do, and one watches a baseball game because baseball is good, and one gazes at the Sistine Chapel ceiling because it elevates the soul. Our machines and computers and cars and iPhones are great, but they are designed ultimately to make the experience of intrinsic value more readily available. One should never, of course, denigrate the practical sciences, but one should have the sense to subordinate them to those disciplines that are properly liberal.

Much of our culture is suffering from the effects of turning this hierarchy on its head.

The Second and Third Apparitions of the Angel in Fatima (Summer 1916): The Angel of Peace appeared when the three children were playing near a well, asking, "What are you doing? *Pray, pray incessantly. Offer prayers and sacrifices to the Almighty.*" Lucy asked him how, to which the Angel answered: "*In everything you do, offer a sacrifice to God to make up for the sins by which God is offended... Above all, accept and endure with submission the suffering which God will send you.*" Toward the end of the Summer, the Angel came to them while they were praying. In his hand he held a chalice, and over it, a bleeding Host. Kneeling, he offered the prayer:

"Most Holy Trinity, Father, Son, and Holy Ghost, I adore Thee profoundly, and I offer Thee the most Precious Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity of our Lord Jesus Christ, present in all the tabernacles of the world, in reparation for the outrages, sacrileges, and indifferences by which He is offended. By the infinite merits of His Most Sacred Heart and the Immaculate Heart of Mary, I beg of Thee the conversion of poor sinners."

After giving the Host to Lucy and the contents of the chalice to Francisco and Jacinta, he said: "*Take and drink the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ, horribly outraged by ungrateful men. Make reparation for their crimes and console your God.*" It was the last time the children saw the Angel of Peace.

We are Raised to New Life

When Jesus went to the tomb of Lazarus, he knew that he was going to raise Lazarus from death to help his disciples believe. So why was he "perturbed and deeply troubled"? It could be that he was disappointed that his friends did not seem to believe that he could do

this. Like Ezekiel, the people of Jesus' time did not expect him literally to raise the dead. But God used the prophet's message to prepare for Jesus' message that not only would he rise from the dead, but we will also. And like the friends and relatives of Lazarus, we too may question how it could be

possible. Fortunately, Jesus helps with that, too.

Look at the second reading from the Letter to the Romans. Because we have God's Spirit living in us, we who are sinners can be raised to new life by that Spirit. When our sins are forgiven, we begin to live a new life by loving the people we hurt by our sins, forgiving people who have hurt us, being more concerned for the poor than for our own comfort. We are freed from worrying about the future, all because we have experienced the new life of God's Spirit and know that God is the Lord.

"...Come to Believe..."

Death does not have the final say. This is the great mystery we ponder on this Fifth Sunday of Lent. Jesus' good friends, Martha and Mary, did not hide their confusion and grief from the Lord; they voiced their conviction that if Jesus had been with them during their brother's illness, he would not have died. Jesus entered into their grief and more—He overturned it. Lazarus' death became the occasion for Jesus to show all who had gathered the mercy of God who cries out, "Oh, my people, I will open your graves and have you rise from them." The world was given a sign of the new life to come.



Eventually, we will all grapple with the death of a loved one—a parent, sibling, spouse, or dear friend. We also begin to come to terms with our own mortality. Our Lenten readings have invited our reflection on the big questions of life and faith. We have resolved to turn away from sin and toward God, listening to the Lord and responding with open minds and hearts. Today, we journey from death to new life, reflecting on the mystery of Christ who is the Resurrection and the Life.

Martha had a uniquely personal relationship with Jesus. She spoke with Him honestly, baring her heart to Jesus, openly expressing her confusion and sorrow at her brother's death. Jesus' response led Martha to a deep declaration of faith, "*I have come to believe that you are the Christ, the Son of God, the one who is coming into the world.*" We, too, can have a uniquely personal relationship with Jesus. We can speak honestly to the Lord, baring our hearts, expressing the truth of each moment of our lives, whether in joy or sorrow, happiness, grief, confusion, or times of fulfillment. In such honesty and trust, we may find deeper faith as well, coming to believe that Christ is our all, our Way, Truth, and Life.


Shower of Roses Annual Benefit Luncheon




STATIONS OF THE CROSS: Also on the Fridays of Lent we pray the Stations. **The new time is 6:30 p.m.** Join us in the church!



Jesus Wept.

There is infinitely more in these two words than any sermonizer, or student of the Word, will ever be able to bring out of them. *Come, Holy Spirit, and help us to discover for ourselves the wealth of meaning contained in these two words!*



We read of other men in Scripture who wept. Abraham, when he buried Sarah, wept; Jacob had power with the angel, for he wept and prevailed; of David, we are continually reading that he wept. His friend Jonathan and he once wept together, and were not unmanned, but were the more truly men for weeping. Of Hezekiah, we read that he wept sore, and of Josiah, that he poured forth tears over the sins of Judah. Jeremiah was a weeping prophet; and I might continue the list, but if I did, it would not be at all remarkable that the sons of a fallen father should weep.

With all the sin and sorrow that surrounds us, it is no marvel that it should be said of any man, "He wept." The earth brings forth thorns and thistles, and the heart brings forth sorrow and sighing. Is there a man or woman who has not wept? Have we not all, sometimes, felt a sweet relief in tears? The marvel is that the sinless Son of God should, in the days of His flesh, know the meaning of strong crying and tears. The fact worthy to be noticed and recorded is that "Jesus wept."

First, "Jesus wept" because He was truly man and was not ashamed of His human weakness; He wept for the pain of His friends. "Jesus wept" for the disciples' lack of faith. Lastly, He wept for His coming suffering because Lazarus' death and resurrection reflected His own.
