

Letter from Fr. Thomas, Pastor



Christ is risen!!! He is risen indeed!!! Blessed Easter, everyone!!!

Today we renew our baptismal promises as the culmination of our Lenten prayer, fasting, and works of mercy. It is meant to help us experience anew and live more and more FROM the Father's and the Son's and the Holy Spirit's love for us. **What does that look like?** A woman walked into a room full of noise, confusion, and worry. As she began to speak to various people, things began to calm down. Another woman came up to her and remarked, "What is it about you?? You walk into a room and people settle down!" The woman answered, "It's because my Father does not tolerate chaos." She was referring to her Heavenly Father. **Tomorrow is Bright Monday**, a day for playing a joke on someone in honor of Jesus playing the greatest joke ever on the devil by rising from the dead.

And then on **Tuesday, April 11, from 10:00 to 11:00 a.m.**, we have a **broomball game scheduled at the Pasadena Ice Skating Center. No skates needed!** Just bring your tennis shoes and a helmet if you have one (not mandatory, but a good idea). Donations accepted (it costs a lot to rent the ice for an hour.)

And now here is Dr Peter Kreeft: Every sermon preached by every Christian in the New Testament centers on the resurrection. The Gospel, or "Good News," means essentially the news of Christ's resurrection. The message that flashed across the ancient world, set hearts on fire, changed lives, and turned the world upside down was not "love your neighbor." Every morally sane person already knew that; it was not news. The news was that a man who claimed to be the Son of God and the Savior of the world had risen from the dead. When Paul preached the Gospel to the Stoic and Epicurean philosophers in Athens, they thought he was preaching two new gods, Jesus and Anastasis (Greek for "resurrection"; Acts 17:18). That's how important the resurrection was. (And that's how muddled the philosophers and scholars were. Nothing changes.)

A reasonable challenge to the skeptic is this: If it can be proved that Jesus really rose from the dead, will you believe in Him? For if he really rose, that validates His claim to be divine and not merely human, for resurrection from death is beyond human power; and His divinity validates the truth of everything else He said, for God cannot lie.

Divine Mercy Sunday Schedule

Next Sunday, April 16, is Divine Mercy Sunday. To mark this feast, we will have a special celebration at St. Therese as follows:

Plenary Indulgence

Our Lord promised St. Faustina that all those would attend Mass and receive Holy Communion on Divine Mercy Sunday, as well as go to Confession and pray for the intentions of the Holy Father, would obtain a plenary indulgence, meaning "complete forgiveness of their sins and punishment." Alternatively, the promise extends to those who, in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament, recite the Our Father and the Creed, adding a devout prayer to the merciful Lord Jesus (e.g. "Merciful Jesus, I trust in you!"), go to Confession, and pray for the intentions of the Holy Father. In 2002, St. John Paul extended the promise so that Confession can be made up to 20 days before or after Divine Mercy Sunday.

"The Resurrection," by Peter Kreeft

Rudolf Bultmann, "the father of demythologizing," said that "if the bones of the dead Jesus were discovered tomorrow in a Palestinian tomb, all the essentials of Christianity would remain unchanged." Paul disagreed. He said that "if Christ has not been raised, then 1) Our proclamation has been in vain and 2) your faith has been in vain. 3) We are even found to be misrepresenting God, because we testified of God that He raised Christ—whom He did not raise if it is true that the dead are not raised. 4) If Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile and 5) you're still in your sins. 6) Then those also who have died in Christ have perished. 7) If for this life only we have hoped in Christ, we are of all people most to be pitied" (1 Cor 15:14-19).

Now who is more likely to know what Christianity is, what its essentials are, and whether these essentials would remain unchanged if Christ's corpse were to turn up tomorrow—the apostle or the skeptic? One of Christianity's first-century founders or one of its twentieth-century subverters? A Jew who knew Christ or a German scholar who knew books? The resurrection is of crucial practical importance because it completes our salvation. Jesus came to save us from sin and its consequence, death (Rom 6:23). (Thus, points 5 and 6 in the above paragraph.) The resurrection also sharply distinguishes Jesus from all other religious founders. The bones of Abraham and Muhammad and Buddha and Confucius and Lao-tzu and Zoroaster are all still here on earth. **Jesus' tomb is empty.**

The existential consequences of the resurrection are incomparable. It is the concrete, factual, empirical proof that life has hope and meaning; "love is stronger than death;" goodness and power are ultimately allies, not enemies; life wins in the end; God has touched us right here where we are and has defeated our last enemy; and we are not cosmic orphans, as our modern secular worldview would make us. And these existential consequences of the resurrection can be seen by comparing the disciples before and after. Before, they ran away, denied their Master, and huddled behind locked doors in fear and confusion. After, they were transformed from scared rabbits into confident saints, world-changing missionaries, courageous martyrs, and joy-filled touring ambassadors for Christ. **The greatest importance of the resurrection is not in the past—"Christ rose"—but in the present—"Christ IS risen."**

The Real St. Therese

After hearing of all of St. Therese's physical sufferings, we are in a better position to appreciate the unconscious irony of Sister Saint-Vincent de Paul's remark: "Why do they speak of Sister Therese of the Child Jesus as if she were a saint? She has practiced virtue, that's true, but she has not acquired virtue at the cost of humiliations, let alone through suffering." It was at the precise moment when Therese, in the infirmary, was suffering such cruel agony that she was told what had been said of her. She wrote in June, "**The more interior the suffering is and the less apparent to the eyes of creatures, the more it rejoices you, my God.**" Others, who were closer to her during this period, have categorically contradicted this assertion of Sister Saint-Vincent de Paul, who was relying solely on appearances. We must be grateful to Mother Agnes for the discreet way in which she recorded her sister's words, for it makes her own very brief comments all the more eloquent. "I was coming to a point where I desired her death so that she wouldn't suffer any longer." Expressions such as these run like a refrain through the Yellow Notebook. To the Guerin family she poured out her own feelings more freely: "I wonder how one can go on living in her condition. I assure you, having seen her suffer so much, I'll be consoled by her death. She'll be so happy." Sister Marie of the Eucharist shared Mother Agnes' views: "And we have even come to desire her deliverance for she's suffering a martyrdom." In their brevity, the doctors' comments also carry great weight. Dr. de Corniere, on September 20, was amazed at her unshakable patience and said: "She's suffering terribly; don't wish to prolong her agony." And Dr. La Neele, after his visit of August 30, said: "Understand, Mother, that this little sister is suffering a veritable martyrdom." Therese herself has told very plainly of her sufferings. She did not act stoic but admitted quite simply what she was feeling. Over the four-month period, her words about her physical sufferings do not appear very numerous, but they provide ample proof of her ascent to Calvary. We shall quote only a few: "**I have suffered very much for several days now.**" "**Ever since July 28, these are big sufferings.**" "**For the last three days, it's true that I've suffered very much.**" "**I feel at this moment that I couldn't suffer any more. Last night I couldn't take any more!**" "**Never would I have believed I could suffer so much, and yet believe I'm not at the end of my pains.**" "**If only you knew what I am suffering,**" etc. She said that she was ground down through suffering, "**like a harassed traveller who falls, exhausted.**" Let us listen finally to what one of the witnesses had to say on this subject: "Three days before she died, I saw her in such pain that I was heartbroken. When I drew close to her bed, she tried to smile, and, in a strangled sort of voice, she said: **"If I didn't have faith, I could never bear such suffering. I am surprised that there aren't more suicides among atheists."** Continues next week, space permitting.

Eucharistic Adoration

"Could you not watch one hour
with me?" (Mark 14:37)



What is Eucharistic Adoration? Eucharistic Adoration is the adoration of Jesus Christ, truly present in the Holy Eucharist as displayed in a special holder called a "monstrance." The first Holy Hour was in the Garden of Olives when Jesus asked the apostles to pray with Him. While it is true that you can pray to God anywhere, it

is especially powerful to adore Jesus in the Holy Eucharist. St. Augustine: "God in his omnipotence could not give more... in His wisdom He knew not how to give more... in His riches He had not more to give, than the Eucharist."

Our Adoration Chapel: Our current Adoration Chapel, named "The Presentation Chapel," was dedicated on February 2, 2015, the Feast of the Presentation. The former Adoration Chapel was restored back to the architect's intended purpose as a Baptistry.

Be a Committed Adorer: Make a commitment to spend an hour or more every week with Our Lord in our Adoration Chapel! To sign up, go to <https://adorationpro.org/thereseca>. Click "Weekly Commitment," find the hour you desire, click "Sign Up" and fill out the form, and click "Signup" to enter it.

Keys to the Chapel | Security: If you have an electronic key and use the chapel after dark, please make sure you engage the lock when you enter so that the door cannot be opened without a key. Please do not let anyone whom you do not know follow you into the chapel if he/she doesn't have a key. This is an extremely important security issue.

Scripture Meditation: Believing is Seeing

You've heard the saying "Seeing is believing." Today's first reading seems to say just the opposite. You might think that when Jesus rose from the dead, everyone would see Him. Then His friends would rejoice and those who had put Him to death would repent (or run as fast as they could!). Yet, Peter says that He was only visible to some of the disciples. Jesus did not appear to Herod or Pilate or Caiaphas. The Pharisees and scribes did not see Him, either. Even the disciples did not immediately see Him. The first thing they saw was the empty tomb, with burial cloths lying on the ground. They may have thought that if His enemies had stolen Jesus' body, they would not have removed the burial cloths; touching a corpse would have made them unclean.

So it seems the empty tomb helped them to believe, and believing enabled them to see the Lord. The exception to this was Thomas, who said he would not believe until he saw and touched Jesus' risen body. Yet when he does see the Lord, Jesus himself declares that believing is primary when He blesses those who have not seen but still believe (John 20:31). I used to think that Jesus was invisible to non-believers, but Mary of Magdala saw Him, thinking He was the gardener. Then she believed and recognized Him.

What does this mean for us? Jesus seems to be hidden again. Yet, we say that we believe He is present in the sacraments; Baptism, Eucharist, and Confirmation show that the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit live in us. So perhaps we just need to believe in order to see him.

Mother Teresa could do it. She said she was amazed at the love she felt when she saw Jesus in the poor and the dying people of Calcutta. St. Francis saw Him not only in the poor but in all creation. Maybe we need to grow in faith so that we can see Jesus in the poor, the dying, the people who annoy us, even our enemies. That is why it is so important to spread the Faith; if we don't see Jesus in everyone, we may never have true peace.




Shower of Roses Annual Benefit Luncheon

Most underwhelming, though, is the Gospel proclamation of the resurrection of Jesus Christ. When we want to hear about angels and earthquakes and trumpets and glory, we hear about a dark, silent, empty tomb. However, like Peter, we must enter into this mystery.

Quiet Listening Prayer

The Interior Castle: The Fourth Mansion

There is one danger I want to warn you about (although I may have mentioned it elsewhere), into which I have seen persons of prayer fall, especially women, for since we are weaker there is more occasion for what I'm about to say. It is that some have a weak constitution because of a great amount of penance, prayer, and keeping vigil, and even without these; in receiving some favor, their nature is overcome. Since they feel some consolation interiorly and a languishing and weakness exteriorly, they think they are experiencing a spiritual sleep (which is a prayer a little more intense than the prayer of quiet), and they let themselves become absorbed. The more they allow this, the more absorbed they become because their nature is further weakened, and they fancy that they are being carried away in rapture. I call it being carried away in foolishness, because it amounts to nothing more than wasting time and wearing down one's health (3, 11).
